Keeping Deaf and Hearing Impaired Children Safe Online

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There are many positives for deaf young people when using social media. The Deaf and Hearing Impairment Team have produced guidance entitled 'Digital Safety- Raising a Deaf Child' on the website as well as a video of signs relating to digital safety.

Digital platforms use many symbols, and knowing what these mean and the British Sign Language equivalent is really important if we are to have meaningful conversations with our deaf young people.

<u>Top Tips</u>

- Don't give out personal information
- Check privacy settings
- Think before you post something, is it harmful to you or other people?
- Don't belive everything you read online
- Remember to ask permission to share information
